# SUBJECT: Amendment to the North Lanarkshire Integration Scheme

# 2. ROUTE TO THE BOARD

Following Scottish Government direction, this paper seeks approval by Lanarkshire NHS Board to amend the North Lanarkshire Integration Scheme. This report has been discussed by the Health and Social Care North Lanarkshire Senior Leadership Team and given that both the NHS Board and South Lanarkshire Council require to endorse any changes to the Integration Scheme, a similar report will be presented to North Lanarkshire Council's Policy and Resources Committee.

# 3. SUMMARY OF KEY ISSUES

#### 3.1 Integration Scheme

- 3.1.1 As part of the requirements of the Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Act 2014, North Lanarkshire Council (NLC) and NHS Lanarkshire (NHSL) worked jointly to draft the North Lanarkshire Integration Scheme to establish a Body Corporate model of integration.
- 3.1.2 Once agreed by both organisations, the draft Integration Scheme was submitted to the Scottish Government for onward approval by the Scottish Parliament. The Scheme was duly approved in June 2015, thus establishing the North Lanarkshire Integration Joint Board (IJB) to become a formal entity of the public sector, similar to that of other public bodies. It was further updated in March 2016 to include Children and Families Social Work services and Criminal Justice Social Work services.
- 3.1.3 The Integration Scheme sets out the agreement under which the integration arrangements operate and details the functions delegated by the Parties (Council and NHS Board) for strategic oversight by the IJB. It also details the legislative framework through which the IJB must work within when agreeing the Strategic Commissioning Plan and any subsequent directions issued by the IJB to the Parties.

3.1.4 The North Lanarkshire Integration Scheme has remained unchanged since March 2016 and is scheduled for formal review in 2021, in line with the requirement to review the Integration Scheme every 5 years.

#### 3.2 **Proposed Changes to the Integration Scheme**

- 3.2.1 In November 2017 the Scottish Government lettered all 31 Health and Social Care Partnerships across Scotland to inform them that an amendment has been made to the Regulations which support the implementation of the Public Bodies (Joint Working) Act 2014. A copy of this letter is outlined in appendix 1.
- 3.2.2 This amendment relates specifically to the Carers (Scotland) Act 2016, which is due to come into effect from 01 April 2018. The implementation of the Carers Act has implications for Integration Authorities, NHS Boards and councils. The amendment requires the new duties cited within this Act to be delegated specifically to Integration authorities.
- 3.2.3 In summary, the main elements of responsibility/duties that this will cover for Integration Authorities in relation to the Carers (Scotland) Act 2016 will be:
  - a new adult carer support plan with a personal outcomes focus
  - a new young carer support plan with a personal outcomes focus
  - a duty to support carers including by means of a local eligibility criteria
  - a duty to prepare a local carers strategy
  - a duty to provide an information and advice service and publish short breaks services statement
  - a duty to involve carers in the discharge from hospital of the people they care for
- 3.2.4 In a North Lanarkshire context many aspects of the above duties have been delivered through local partnership arrangements. However, the duties of the Act now formalises many of these arrangements which have grown as a result of the existing and previous carers strategies for North Lanarkshire.
- 3.2.6 The amendment to the Integration Scheme is relatively minor and relates only to the requirement to include the Carers Act responsibilities. However, in conjunction with Legal services, further work is underway to include the specific duties of the Children and Young People (Scotland) Act 2014 and the Community Justice (Scotland) Act 2016, with changes planned to be finalised in the first half of 2018/19.
- 3.2.7 A full copy of this amendment to the Integration Scheme is detailed in appendix 2.

#### 3.3 Next Steps

- 3.3.1 Progress with the implementation of the Carers (Scotland) Act 2016 will be formally reported through a number of forums including the IJB, Performance, Finance and Audit Committee and Social Work Committee.
- 3.3.2 Moreover, the requirement to implement the duties of the Act will also form one of the 2018/19 directions from the IJB to the Council and also been a commissioning intention within the refreshed Health and Social Care Strategic Commissioning Plan.

- 3.3.3 A report similar to this will also be presented through North Lanarkshire Council's Policy and Resources Committee, given that both Parties require to approve the Integration Scheme and any amendments to this.
- 3.3.4 On completion of both these routes of approval, the revised Integration Scheme will be formally submitted to the Scottish Government.
