University Hospital Hairmyres continues to achieve excellent feedback for the Medicine block. Key features that contribute to this are common across many areas of undergraduate education in Lanarkshire. The block has an Educational Lead position which is split between 2 people who have adequate time in their job plans to organise and supervise the block. They are supported by 2 CTFs who spend 80% of their time in Medical Education including time assigned to study for a higher academic award in Medical Education. The departments across NHSL assess and where appropriate apply innovative teaching techniques such as low-fi simulation. The students have access to speciality teaching sessions but are also able to use separate weekly sessions with the CTFs to review any gaps in their knowledge.

The Ophthalmology block feedback has improved. The block which is combined with ENT now has a week a centralised teaching followed by 2 weeks of Ophthalmology rotating with 2 weeks of ENT. The concentration of the centralised teaching has meant less travelling for students and more opportunities on site. It has also made it easier for the Educational Lead to organise student timetables.

Although the scores remain above average there has been a drop off this year. Unfortunately due to reorganisation within the unit and staff moving to other areas there have been 2 changes to the Educational Lead and despite a well-motivated team the scores have suffered this year. I would expect them to recover given the key elements remain in place. These include a surgical familiarisation course delivered in their first week covering basic theatre skills and etiquette making them more comfortable attending theatre sessions. The surgical specialities for breast, urology and vascular offer combined sessions with students from the other 2 acute sites in NHS Lanarkshire ensuring that tutor time is used to its best advantage. In addition the students have a day of simulation at Kirklands Hospital for the Recognition and Management of the Sick Patient delivered by a highly skilled faculty.

The Emergency Medicine Department block is similar to that offered at University Hospital Hairmyres And University Hospital Wishaw. The students are attached in shifts and are encouraged to integrate into the clinical team. They attend a whole day of simulation in Emergency Medicine at Kirklands Hospital. The students also are allocated a day following a Scottish Ambulance Service crew giving them experience of pre-hospital care. The unit was recognised in 2019 with a Recognition of Excellence award from the Medical Undergraduate Quality Review Panel. The Educational Lead has time identified in their job plan to co-ordinate the block.

Similar to ophthalmology the ENT block has been re-organised with a week of centralised teaching before two 2 week blocks in ENT and ophthalmology. The benefits regarding reducing student travel and organisation of timetables is apparent. In addition University Hospital Monklands is fortunate in not only having an Educational Lead but also the ENT Year Lead for University of Glasgow is based here. Between them they have managed to organise excellent access to the ENT ward, clinics and theatres with a well-motivated team.

The Surgery block feedback has continued to improve. This is due to a combination of factors. The block is led by a clinician with dedicated time in their job plan and who also has a track record in Medical Education. He is supported by input from a couple of Clinical Teaching Fellows. We offer all students a surgical familiarisation experience early in the block which helps them feel more comfortable in the theatre environment. They also attend a simulation course on the Recognition and Management of the Sick Patient delivered by an experienced and skilled faculty. Surgical specialities offer centralised teaching sessions for NHS Lanarkshire students. This has allowed us to improve the learning opportunities for students in areas where we have relatively few consultants. The block also includes weekly exposure to anaesthetics and ICU. In addition the students are given individual timetables via Google which helps the CTFs ensure the students are given adequate opportunities to meet their ILOs for the block.

The feedback remains excellent for the Medicine block and was highlighted for Improvement to Placement by the Medical Undergraduate Quality Review Panel. The students are provided with timetables using Google calendar. Speciality based teaching is supported by CTF sessions which can be altered according to the students' requirements. They also have access to low-fi simulation sessions with minimal specialist equipment but using well practised scenarios delivered by CTFs trained in delivering simulation. The students also join the more formal Emergency Medicine simulation day based at Kirklands Hospital.
