2. ROUTE TO THE BOARD

This paper has been prepared by Paul Cannon, Board Secretary.

3. SUMMARY OF KEY ISSUES

This approach, to bring about a whole system response, was put in place prior to Christmas 2019, and was adopted by NHS Lanarkshire, both Local Authority Chief Executives, both Health & Social Care Partnerships and the Ambulance Service.

Two appendices are attached to this cover paper. These are

- A) De-escalation protocol
- B) Plan for managing a Significant Incident in the event of reaching Full Capacity Protocol across NHS Lanarkshire

There is a three stage approach to dealing with unexpected surges in demands for Acute Hospital beds. Appendix A sets out the staged approach.

Only by arriving at Stage 3 (Appendix A) would the full protocol be invoked.

Since mid-January 2020, stage 2 has been triggered on 4 occasions (twice at University Hospital Wishaw and twice at University Hospital Hairmyres). Stage 3 has only been activated once, in early March 2020, at University Hospital Hairmyres.

The de-escalation protocol allows a graduated and co-ordinated whole system approach to be adopted to dealing with significant demands on Acute Hospital beds. It has been a key control measure in the approach to facing winter demands, and sets out clearly the actions to be taken in advance so that actions can be taken swiftly and safely.

We will review the use of the protocol in the contact of the fuller review of Winter Planning, but there is doubt that it has been significant helpful in co-ordinating urgent responses.
