3. SUMMARY OF KEY ISSUES

The last DPH Annual Report in 2017.18 produced by my predecessor Gabe Docherty raised a number of key issues and made a number of recommendations. The intention at that time was to formally review progress on these recommendations on a two yearly basis however the pandemic has impacted on this process, and the intention for the future will be to re-instate this review and look for new and innovative ways of demonstrating the impact of the work of the Directorate on the issues affecting the health of the population of Lanarkshire.

Our report this year focusses on a number of key areas post-pandemic, some of which were evident pre-pandemic but have been very clearly exacerbated as a result of the pandemic and other significant factors:

- Identifying the impact of the pandemic on those with Long Term conditions in Lanarkshire and how to provide support and services to address the needs of those patients.
- Cost of Living crisis and the impact this is having on the health & wellbeing of the population.

- Covid-19 and its impact on Health Inequalities across our communities and focussing on those areas of the community which have been disproportionately impacted
- Health Improvement and the significant impact the work of that service strives to have on through a number of areas including Mental Health; Smoking Cessation and Maternal and Infant Screening
- Focusing on Cancer inequalities across North and South Lanarkshire and what
 we can learn from the data to put systems and processes in place to try to
 mitigate the impact of those inequalities
- The impact of the pandemic in relation to dentistry is well documented, significant work is ongoing to address the Four Harms (Direct harm to people's health; Wider impact on Health and Social Care Services; The restrictions in place due to the pandemic which restricted our broader way of living and society; The impact on the economy and the damaging effect on poverty and inequalities) and how services will require to respond and mitigate these impacts.
