The procedure you have had today was an Endoscopy which was carried out by:

FOLLOWING YOUR PROCEDURE

If you have been given sedation it will take several hours for the effects to wear off completely. Therefore, you must have a responsible adult to collect you and remain with you over the next 24 hours.

YOU MUST NOT:

- drive a vehicle or bicycle;
- operate machinery or domestic appliances;
- drink alcohol;
- be solely responsible for children or babies;
- take sleeping tablets; or
- sign any important documents until the day after your procedure.

YOU MAY:

- You may resume your normal diet (unless otherwise indicated).
- You may resume your normal medication (unless otherwise indicated).

WHAT TO EXPECT FOLLOWING YOUR PROCEDURE

- During the examination gas has been blown into your stomach. This may cause some slight discomfort or bloating but should settle within a few hours.
- 2) Your throat may feel tender for a few hours but should settle quickly. Throat sweets may help.
- Problems following this type of examination are rare, however if you experience any of the following:
 - severe pain or vomiting
 - passage or vomiting of blood
 - high temperature
 - swelling, tenderness or redness at the injection site then contact the Endoscopy Unit you attended
 - then please seek medical advice (see the contact numbers on the back page of this leaflet).
