Children require different sensations to develop their sensory systems. Some children may need extra input. Here is variety of suggested toys and materials that provided specific **auditory** input. You can add your own ideas.

	<p>Rainmaker - Turn, twist and shake the rainmaker to see and hear the beads cascading through the holes to make a rain sound. Stimulates the auditory sense and helps develop hand eye co-ordination.</p> <p><a href="http://www.amazon.co.uk">www.amazon.co.uk</a></p>
	<p>Music books – Providing a variety of sounds with a story involved. Encourage child to press buttons to make sound with hand over hand assistance.</p> <p>Available from a variety of outlets</p>
