




Hormonal Contraceptive Interaction with Sugammadex (Bridion®)

Discharge Information for female patients following surgery



- Sugammadex (Bridion®) is a medicine that helps to speed up recovery from anaesthetic drugs (muscle relaxant) which patients may be given during surgery.
- Sugammadex is known to decrease the effectiveness of your hormonal contraceptive (birth control) for up to 7 (seven) days.
 - You should use a backup (non-hormonal) birth control method for up to 7 (seven) days after your procedure or surgery
 - Continue taking your hormonal contraceptive during this period

WHAT ARE HORMONAL CONTRACEPTIVES?

- Combined pill or progesterone only pill (Oral contraceptive)
- Injectable contraceptives (e.g. depoprovera)
- Implantable contraceptives (small plastic rod or device inserted under the skin or inside the uterus)
- Contraceptive patches (small adhesive patch worn on the skin)
- Vaginal rings (flexible plastic ring inserted into the vagina)
- Hormonal coil (e.g. Mirena)

You may want to consider one or more of these backup birth control methods:

- Male condom
- Female condom
- Female diaphragm
- Female cervical cap and sponge
- Abstinence (not having sex)
